Warming Cabinet is Vital for Patient Comfort in the ER

When Callie Post, Fitzgibbon Hospital's Director of Emergency Services, submitted a Wish List request to the Auxiliary last year for a Warming Cabinet, the Auxiliary was pleased to be able to fulfill this almost \$7,000 request.

Medical professionals everywhere want to provide the very best possible care for their patients, and the Emergency Department at Fitzgibbon is certainly no exception. Keeping patients comfortable and as pain-free as possible are two important aspects of providing excellent patient care, which is why a warming cabinet is so essential. Besides increased patient comfort, warming patients also helps to reduce anxiety, bleeding, and the chances of cardiac problems, while helping to increase a patient's re-



sponse to medication and faster recovery. Warmed blankets are often used in emergency departments to make patients feel more comfortable in cool, ambient temperatures or when sedation or anesthesia has disturbed the body's thermal regulation.

In addition to heating blankets, warming cabinets also warm irrigation fluids and intravenous (IV) solutions. Nearly one-quarter of emergency department patients in the United States are treated with intravenous fluids. These fluids are typically stored at room temperature and infused into patients without prior warming. During infusion of room-temperature IV fluids, some patients experience shivering, chills and discomfort. Warming IV fluids to body temperature prior to infusion is associated with improved comfort for adult ED patients compared to standard, room temperature IV fluids.

Fitzgibbon Hospital continues to strive for excellence in patient care to ensure patients have a positive experience. We hope the Auxiliary can play a small part in linking customer service and patient-centered care.

And remember, Fitzgibbon Hospital is a 501(c)3 not-for-profit hospital whose only financial support comes from revenues received from the care we provide. We do not receive tax revenues and are not part of a hospital district or municipality. As a stand-alone hospital governed by a board of directors, we look to the generosity of our community help us fill in our financial gaps.

Our next fundraising effort is The Fling, which is going to be virtual this year. Andrea Barr, our new Foundation Director, is working hard with her team to create a fun event that will provide an outlet for people to contribute to this very important update for the Fitzgibbon Community Cancer Center. Look for more information very soon!

Finally, amid all of the activity around our vaccine and fundraising events, we also are entering the season for health fairs. Last year, we had to cancel our health fairs that have been offered to our community for nearly 30 years. This year, we are excited to say that we will resume offering these fairs, beginning with Brunswick fair on March 13 at Grand River Health Clinic and Fitzgibbon Hospital on April 30. This year's health fairs will allow individuals to receive the Covid-19 Antibody test as part of their standard health fair blood test package. This is an exciting new offering that we think will encourage people to take advantage of the opportunity to learn more about their health.

Again, allow me to speak for all of us at Fitzgibbon Hospital, The Living Center and our clinics by saying our hearts are full when we think back on a difficult year, but a year filled with so many acts of kindness toward our heroes in healthcare.

In 2020 Fitzgibbon Hospital Auxiliary Ambassadors marked its 55th year impacting patient care through gifts of funds and services with the support of our community of volunteers.

In partnership with Fitzgibbon Hospital, the Auxiliary supports requests from departments throughout the hospital for "Wish List" items, scholarships for students in the healthcare field, and staff requests for continuing education conferences and in-services. It is through our fundraising events throughout the year that the monies are raised to fund these requests.

In 2020 the Auxiliary, like most of the world, was unable to have some of their fundraisers, including the rummage sales, book sales, and the Grandaddy's Garden tea party. These fundraisers usually bring in around \$7,500. There was only one bake sale in 2020, which was our Valentine's Day bake sale, and it raised \$1,200. There were three uniform sales that added another \$3,000. In 2020 the Nutman Company was on location only once for a two-day sale for employees only, which added another \$272.

The Annual Bazaar is, of course, the biggest fundraiser of the year, both in terms of planning and implementation and profit. In 2020 the Bazaar was "re-imagined" to a drive thru and raffles only, which netted \$12,042 — a compilation of money from raffle ticket sales, chili supper receipts, and membership dues. This amount is \$7,000 less than 2019 due to not being able to have vendors, the bake sale, the silent auctions, and the Gift Shop booth. Local business sponsorships and donations of goods and services also added substantially to the Bazaar profit.

- Membership dues and chili supper tickets totaled \$5,916.
- The Raffle, headed again this year by Jacque Hare and her hard-working team, profited \$6,126.

None of this could have been accomplished without the teamwork and dedication of our members. A quote from Audrey Hepburn says it best, "As you grow older, you will discover that you have two hands — one for helping yourself, the other for helping others." Without all the helping hands from our volunteers we would not be able to accomplish what we do. Your dedication and service are tremendously appreciated.
