If you received the **MODERNA VACCINE . . .**

Moderna boosters have NOT been authorized. Please wait for further public health guidance.

You are eligible for a **3rd dose of Moderna*** ONLY if . . .
you have a **moderately- to severely-compromised immune system*** and it has been at least **28 days** since your initial two-shot series.

If you received the **PFIZER VACCINE . . .**

You are eligible for the **Pfizer booster[±]** if you completed the Pfizer vaccine series at least six (6) months ago **AND** you are:

- aged 65 years and older;
- aged 18-64 and at-risk for severe disease due to an eligible underlying medical condition[±];
- aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of job risk or institutional setting (e.g. frontline medical workers, teachers, and first responders)

You are eligible for a **3rd dose of Pfizer*** ONLY if . . .
you have a **moderately- to severely-compromised immune system*** and it has been at least **28 days** since your initial two-shot series.

*** For moderately to severely immunocompromised people, the CDC is recommending a 3rd dose.**

This includes people who have:

- Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood
- Received an organ transplant and are taking medications to suppress the immune system
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last 2 years or are taking medicine to suppress the immune system
- Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome)
- Advanced or untreated HIV infection
- Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that may suppress your immune response

People should talk to their healthcare provider about their medical condition, and whether getting an additional dose is appropriate for them.

± For PFIZER ONLY: Medical conditions considered high-risk by the CDC – and which qualify people 18-64 for the Pfizer Booster – are as follows:

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- Chronic lung diseases, including COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease), asthma (moderate-to-severe), interstitial lung disease, cystic fibrosis, and pulmonary hypertension
- Dementia or other neurological conditions
- Diabetes (type 1 or type 2)
- Down syndrome
- Heart conditions (such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, cardiomyopathies or hypertension)
- HIV infection
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system)
- Liver disease
- Overweight and obesity
- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease or thalassemia
- Smoking, current or former
- Solid organ or blood stem cell transplant
- Stroke or cerebrovascular disease, which affects blood flow to the brain
- Substance use disorders
